Who Are We?

Parish Councils are the lowest or first tier of Local Government. Clayton-le-Woods is a large Parish within the boundary of Chorley and has a long history. It was established in 1894 and comprises 15 voluntary Parish Councillors who are elected for a four-year term of office to serve and administer to the needs of the residents of Clayton-le-Woods.

The Parish Council employs two part-time staff members, the Clerk to the Council, who administers the Parish Council and ensures that the Council conducts its business properly: and a Projects Officer who assists the Councillors in delivering the varied projects across the Parish.

The Parish Council is funded through a precept on each residential property in the Parish through your Council Tax payments. This enables us to carry out our duties to improve and maintain the area in which we live.

What Do We Do?

The Parish Council owns several assets, including Back Lane Woods, several Play Areas and the Skate Park near Clayton Green library. The maintenance and improvements to these assets remains high on our agenda, as does the appearance of the Parish.

We employ Lengthsmen from Lisieux Hall to help keep the Parish litter free and we maintain many of the flower beds around the Parish. This helps to make Clayton-le-Woods one of the prettiest and tidiest parishes in the whole of Chorley. We hope you agree!





Parish Council are installing 2 new noticeboards within Back Lane Woods to inform residents about the exciting projects and eco initiatives



Noticeboards originated from a cork sheet which was created by collecting waste cork particles and using heat and pressure to bind the cork together. This process was perfected in 1891 so repurposing is not a new concept!

Unfortunately, little is known about the earliest pin boards aside from the patent issued by an American Mr George Brooks. However, history tells us that word did eventually spread to other parts of the US and today cork boards are a universal phenomenon around the world.

Even with the advent of the Internet and social media notice boards still have their role to play today. The noticeboards provide the Parish with a visible identity on the street and we can advise the public on a wide number of matters such as health/social updates, legal issues, elections and to publicise events such as the Scarecrow Festival which is scheduled for July 2021.

Please keep an eye out for our notice boards near you and the information that we provide to you during the year. The Parish Council have five stand-alone notice boards and one internal notice board area. Do you know where they all are? The answers will be at the back of this Newsletter.



Finance Information 2021/22

he annual budget was compiled by all the Members of the Parish Council by Committee. The budget was set by the Parish Council in January 2021.

The pie chart gives a representation of the proposed spending budget for 2021/22. Adjustments will be made during the year according to the needs of the village especially during this challenging time.



Precept 2021/22


Once the budget is set, the annual 'Precept' or local tax amount is calculated. The Precept is set by a formula to 'Band D' households which is set at £22.00 for the year 2021/22. The Parish Council have not increased this amount in the past 3 years. Our Precept is collected by Chorley Council as the local authority.

The graph below shows all the precept bandings set in Clayton-le-Woods for 2021/22 (A - H). The Income from the Precept for 2021/22 is £122,049.00 which is made up of £110,591.80 collected from the residents and £11,458.00 deprivation grant.

The deprivation grant is awarded where there are areas in the community that meet the complex criteria set by the government which covers such things as health, income, education and environment.

CIL Funding

In addition to the Precept, the Parish Council receives Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) funding which is monies that are received from certain new developments within the Parish. CIL funding can be spent on any project which provides a permanent infrastructure within the local area.



Applications are evaluated by the Parish Council in February and July of each year. You can read about some current CIL funded projects in the newsletter. The CIL budget as of the 31st of March 2021 is as follows:

of an Outdoor Classroom. The Brothers of Charity are a registered Charity supporting 250+ people with learning disabilities across Lancashire.

The aim of the project was to create an accessible area for people to appreciate the landscape and work out of doors during the summer months.

People with dementia, autism or general mobility issues do not have the confidence to access the outdoors; this area provides a safe place for people to benefit from being outdoors.

The project also created an inclusive working environment enabling our artists with learning difficulties to work with professional designers to create the design of the wet pour surface, a seating and a planted area.

As you can see from the above photograph, a beautiful outdoor classroom has been created.

Leonora Carrington

CIL funding was used by the Parish Council to commemorate the life of the artist Leonora Carrington, who was born in Clayton-le-Woods at Westwood House (now demolished) which stood on a site close to Clayton Green Library. She was a surrealist artist, author and poet and she championed the Women's Liberation Movement in Mexico.

She died in Mexico City in 2011 at the age of 94.

The commemoration takes the form of an information board on Preston Road adjacent to the Lidl roundabout.

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Community Infrastructure Levy

- New Projects Approved

A / e reported in the Winter Newsletter that we had supported a number of projects in the Parish using Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL for short) funding, so we thought we would give you an update on some of the new projects that the Parish Council has recently approved.

Chill Out Zone

The Parish Council has granted CIL funding to Manor Road Primary School to enable them to create a "Chill Out Zone" The school wanted to provide an area for older children and community groups who use the area as a space to relax, take time away from the hustle and bustle of the main playground. They will benefit from an area of calm which will help with emotional wellbeing and sensory needs. The school is funding half the cost of the project from PTFA fundraising activity.



Work on the project has been delayed due to Covid-19 but the school anticipates work getting underway soon.

Dog Bag Dispensers

The Parish Council funded a pilot to trial the provision of Dog Bag Dispensers

in six locations within the Parish Council area to assess their effectiveness in reducing dog fouling. The pilot has proved very successful and the Parish Council has agreed to use CIL funding to extend the scheme and provide a further four Dog Bag Dispensers in the area.

Councillor Mark Clifford conducted an online poll on behalf of the Parish Council to find out where residents thought the new dispensers should be located. Residents responded very positively to this and the Parish Council is now progressing further work to assess the feasibility of the suggested locations as not all the sites are on land belonging to the Parish Council. The Council is therefore liaising with Chorley Council to progress this.

The new locations are, at Back Lane Woods; the junction with Mendip Rd and Pendle Rd; Clayton Green Road by the entrance to Cam Wood Fold and at Higher Meadow Ponds.



Speed Indicator Devices

Speeding on the roads within the Parish has been a source of much concern from residents in the area. For a number of years the Parish Council have set up a mobile Speed Indicator Device, known as a SpID, in different locations on lampposts in the Parish area. However, this is only effective as long as the battery remains live which, in some locations where the volume of traffic is high, is only a few days.



The Parish Council has agreed to use CIL to fund the provision of 4 permanent SpIDs at key speeding hotspots in the parish. Work is now underway with Lancashire County Council's Highway's Team so they can assess the suitability of the locations. Once the locations have been finally determined and approved by Lancashire County Council, the Parish Council will progress the installation of the SpIDs.

The locations submitted to Lancashire County are shown below: (there may be changes to these, subject to LCCs assessment).

- Proposed site on the west side of the A6, in the direction towards Preston. Proposed location to be outside the new Doctors Surgery currently being built, or some point along the stretch from the Clayton-le-Woods boundary sign by the war memorial up to the site of the new doctor's surgery.
- Proposed location is opposite the Dog Inn car park entrance on Chorley Old Road in the northerly direction towards Brindle, between lampposts numbered 53 and
- The proposed location is on Clayton Brook Road, before lamppost no 5 after the junction with Pines Close
- The proposed location is the stretch on Lancaster Lane from Kent Drive to Levens Drive close by lamppost no 7, heading eastwards away from Leyland.

Clayton Green Library

e reported in the Winter Newsletter that Clayton Green library had re-opened, however due to the January lockdown the library had to close to visitors, although you could still return and collect books and use the computers for essential use.

It is good to report that the library is now open. It is COVID safe, with measures in place to provide hand sanitisers, screens to protect the staff and public, social distancing and the capture of contact details for track and trace. Face coverings must be worn in the library unless you are

The Parish Council is very arateful for Mark's expertise in repairing the Silent Soldier and returning it to it's place on Sheep Hill Brow.

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Clayton-le-Woods Scarecrow Festival 2021


Work is already underway behind the scenes to ensure that our 2022 Summer Fair will be the biggest and most

A 'Gem' in the 'Valley of the Hawks!'



f you are wondering about the title of this article, I've been researching some history on the grade 2 listed building, 'Hawksclough' farmhouse next to Clayton Brook on the northern borders of Cuerden Valley Park.

Hawk is obviously the name for a bird of prey and Clough means a narrow valley, so it's an apt name for this lovely historic house, on the edge of the Parklands. The valley is also home to Sparrow Hawks, Buzzards and Kestrels, who are seen regularly in the area.

There is a place called Hawksclough at Hebden Bridge in East Lancs, but why the house was called this, is a bit if a mystery. George Bolton, in his book, 'Clayton in History' states in his chapter on farms, *'Hawksclough, An interestingly named farm, suggesting great antiquity, but the earliest reference to the name so far is 1733.' The symbol of the Townley family is the Hawk on their family crest, which can be seen at Cuerden Hall.

George Bolton goes on to mention that a family called the Withingtons lived at the farm in the early 17th Century and the area was an, *'example of a divided tenement.' The Burgess family, who were decendants of the 16th century bailiffs to the Townleys, were residents there in the early 18th Century - could there be a link here when Robert Parker of Cuerden Hall married Anne Townley in the mid 1700s? Robert Parker became the owner of the farm 1748 and let it out to a Thomas Mather, who sublet it to a Thomas Burgess and Anne Heys.

The Burgess family were thought to have held Catholic masses at the farm due to there being no Roman chapels in the area to worship; most being destroyed by Henry VIII and his pals. Apparently the remains of a 'Priest's robing room' were found at the house. Later the Burgess family became the benefactors of St. Bede's Church at Clayton-le-Woods in 1824.

Hawksclough house has now been sold to a new owner, who is currently in the throes of restoring the house and bringing it back to its former glory, after a long period of neglect. Also the other properties on the estate are also being sold as future dwellings. Its wonderful to see these historic buildings are at last being preserved, as there are not many left in the area.

As a passionate painter of watercolours, I'm sure you'll agree with me that the picture of the house is a forthcoming contender.

Improvements Planned at Cuerden Valley Park

ork is due to start this Summer on a new path which will connect the Visitor Centre at the Park down to the existing main cycle and pedestrian path along the River Lostock.

Thanks to funding from Clayton le Woods Parish Council's CIL fund, along with match funding from Lancashire Environmental Fund, this project will also create 2 hectares of new lowland meadow to support national attempts to restore wildflower meadow habitats and educate the public to their importance.

The new path will replace the existing route from the wooden bridge up to the Pinetum, which is seriously eroded by rainwater arising from surface water flooding.

Simon Thorpe, General Manager explained that:

"It's not practical to replace the existing path to a standard which is fully accessible for all visitors in a gulley that acts as a funnel for surface water from the surrounding fields. Visitors will know that the tarmac path often resembles a small stream. This route will be downgraded to an unmade woodland path."

The new path will wind its way up the valley through the field making the gradient suitable for all visitors.

We're particularly excited about using a new material for the path surface, comprising recycled aggregate and recycled rubber from tyres, called Nu-flex. Not only are these recycled products turned into something useful but it is also porous which allows water to drain away reducing flooding.

The wildflower meadow will be sown with varieties found

in other species-rich grassland at the Park and common to this part of Lancashire such as yellow rattle, common knapweed, ladies bedstraw and early purple orchid. Work on the new path is expected to start this summer and it's planned for volunteers and local groups to be invited to help sow plugs of wildflowers in the Autumn.

The field in front of the Visitor Centre was rented to one of our farm tenants to graze cattle. We're grateful to the tenant for the early release of the land back to the Trust so that we can deliver this project for the benefit of the community and nature.
