Your Parish Council Who are we?

Parish Councils are civil Local Authorities, being the lowest, or first tier of local government. Clayton-le-Woods is a large Parish within the borough of Chorley and has a long history, being established in 1894. It consists of 15 voluntary Parish Councillors who are elected for a four year term of office to serve and administer to the needs of the residents of Clayton-le-Woods village. It employs a Clerk to the Council and funding is raised by a precept on each residential property in the Parish, via your Council Tax. This allows us to carry out our duties to both improve and maintain the area in which we live.

What do we do?

The Parish Council owns a number of assets, including the Community Centre on Spring Meadow; Back Lane Woods; several Play Areas and the Skate Park near to Asda. The maintenance and improvement of these areas remains high on our agenda, as does the appearance of the area.

We employ Lengths Men from Lisieux Hall to help keep the area litter-free and we maintain many of the flower beds around the Parish. Hence, we believe that Clayton is one of the prettiest and tidiest parishes in the whole of Chorley. We hope you agree!

If you have any ideas to improve the area, we'd be pleased to hear from you – just contact your local parish councillor or the parish clerk.

JO COX REMEMBRANCE

In the summer, it will be a year since Jo Cox, was murdered whilst carrying out her work as an MP for the community in Batley. To commemorate her life, her family are asking local communities around the country to organise a community get-together around food. This could be a tea party, a BBQ, a bake-off or a street party. This campaign is being run by the Jo Cox Foundation to send a message 'that there is more that unites us than divides us'. The events are due to take place 17/18 June 2017.

WHITTLE-LE-WOODS AND **CLAYTON-LE-WOODS WAR MEMORIAL**

Our Cenotaph is cared for by the War Memorial Committee, founded in 1926. It consists of Parish Councillors from both Clayton-le-Woods and Whittle-le-Woods Parish Councils. A primary function of the of the Committee is to manage the maintenance of the War Memorial, surrounding gardens and car park with funding provided by the two Parish Councils.

In Novemb<mark>er each yea</mark>r, a Remembrance Service is held at the Cenotaph, attended by the Mayor and Mayoress, County, Borough and Parish Councillors, British Legion, Cubs and Brownies and the Police. The service is conducted by local Clergy. Starting at Whittle-le-Woods C E Primary School at 2:30pm, a procession marches along Preston Road to the Cenotaph, accompanied by Brindle Brass Band. The service is conducted by local Clergy and wreaths are laid.

The War Memorial grounds continue to be carefully managed by the Committee who ensure that these are kept in a lovely condition where members of the public can visit or just sit and relax in a quiet environment.



CLAYTON-LE-WOODS COMMUNITY CENTRE

The Community Centre, owned by the Parish Council and located in Spring Meadow, is home to a variety of activities including: Happy House Nursery; Rainbows, Brownies and Guides; Kick Boxing; WI Craft; Haydock School of Dance; 50 plus Keep Fit; Clayton Christian Fellowship and Dog Training. PRECEPT

The parish precept has been set for 2017/18 and in order to balance the budget for expenditure on improvements this year and to meet our legal obligations, the precept is to increase. For a Band D property, it represents an increase of £6 over last year, which equates to just 12p a week.

The parish precept enables the Parish Council to undertake its statutory duties and to improve our environment and the lives of those it serves. We are undertaking a number of major projects this year, including the renewal of a play area and a community woodland. The Parish Council also gives out small grants on an annual basis to community and uniformed groups to fund projects that will enhance our neighbourhood or will in some way benefit residents of Clayton-le-Woods.

If you think you have something worth supporting by the Parish Council just contact the clerk to see whether you are eligible for support for that special project or look on our website for the Grants Policy.

Two Trees Community Garden Project

The Parish Council has recently given a grant to the Two Trees Community Garden Group to create an orchard and wildflower meadow in the open space between Back Lane and Bearswood Croft. This work, match-funded by the Borough Council, is to start in April

CLAYTON IN BYGONE TIMES

The Manor House

In medieval times, Clayton-le-Woods once had a Manor House, called **Clayton Hall**, situated in the area near Spring Meadow, not far from the landfill site. The earliest records of a manor at 'Cleyton' are mentioned in a Court roll in the time of Elizabeth the 1st 1574. Lords of the Manor were the Andertons and after they left the hall in 1693, the hall was tenanted by such families as the Molyneauxs, the Wrights and the Bootles.

In Victorian times, Clayton Hall was described "as a picturesque, 17th Century two-storey brick built building on a high stone base, with low mullioned windows and stone slate roof. The bricks are a weathered, warm dark red with ivy over the front. The porch has a four centred arched doorway with an old oak nailed-studded door".

Sadly, we can only now view the ruins where this once iconic building stood, for in 1976 the hall became derelict and had to be demolished. There are photographs kept in the archives of the Red Rose Collections at Lancashire County Council that we have permission to reproduce here.

Do you know your boundaries?

Clayton-Le-Woods is the largest village within the borough of Chorley and only Chorley itself has more houses than Clayton-Le-Woods. There are many residents who live in Clayton-Le-Woods and may not realise. The boundaries of the village are largely defined by the motorways of the M61, M65 and M6. Postal addresses can be misleading as we have many residents with postal addresses in Bamber Bridge, Leyland and also Whittle-Le-Woods when actually these houses lie within Clayton-Le-Woods. Confusing matters further are place names, such as Whittle Spinney, actually in Clayton-Le-Woods and Cuerden Valley Park, where around two thirds fall within our village boundary too.
