Your Parish Council

Who are we?

Parish Councils are the lowest or first tier of Local Government. Clayton-le-Woods is a large Parish within the boundary of Chorley and has a long history. It was established in 1894 which comprises 15 voluntary Parish Councillors who are elected for a four year term of office to serve and administer to the needs of the residents of Clayton-le-Woods. The Parish Council employs two part time staff members, a Clerk to the Council, who administers the Parish Council and ensures that the Council conducts its business properly; and a Projects Officer who assists the Councillors in delivering the varied projects across the Parish. The Parish Council is funded through a precept on each residential property in the parish, through your Council tax. This enables us to carry out our duties to improve and maintain the area in which we live.

What do we do?

The Parish Council owns several assets, including Back Lane Woods, several Play Areas and the Skate park near to Asda. The maintenance and improvements of these areas remains high on our agenda, as does the appearance of the Parish.

We employ Lengthsmen from Lisieux Hall to help keep the Parish litter free and we maintain many of the flower beds around the Parish. This helps to make Clayton-le-Woods one of the prettiest and tidiest parishes in the whole of Chorley.

We hope you agree!

Clayton is Blooming Lovely!!

Clayton-le-Woods was awash with colour this Spring and Summer. Hanging baskets were decorated along Preston Road, Lancaster Lane and Clayton Brook Road. Different themes were highlighted and brought to fruition by a team of green-fingered residents and Councillors.

At Clayton Bottoms, a flower bed was created commemorating the 100th anniversary of the end of WW1. This features a six-foot silhouette of a soldier representing the brave soldiers who were unable to return. The volunteers also transformed a nearby disused Grit Bin into a floral 'feast', complete with picnic baskets full of eye-catching blooms.

A new 'temporary' flower installation was created at Stonehouse Green, celebrating 70 years of the NHS. With the help of a few folk from the Brothers of Charity at Lisieux Hall, there was a party table with a 3-tier floral cake and party bags galore, overflowing with brightly-coloured blooms.

New Footpaths at Whittle Spinney

New footpaths will put an end to slipping and sliding!

Clayton-le-Woods Parish Council are currently having two new footpaths installed to help access into the Whittle Spinney woodlands.

Chairman of the Council Cllr. Mark Clifford says "This is fantastic news for our residents. Residents have been asking me for these paths for quite a while now and it is great to announce that they are now being installed to improve access into the Spinney for all. For too long people have been slipping and sliding whilst visiting from Knebworth Close and also on Birchin Lane. These paths will allow our residents to have a brilliant circular walk and will be great for those with mobility issues"

Chair of Environment Cllr. Michelle Gallagher says" it's great to see these paths and we look forward to working on many more exciting projects that will benefit the community over the coming months and years."

The path work is due to be completed by mid November.

Sale of Local Landmark

A local landmark in Clayton-le-Woods could be secured to provide much-needed facilities in the community after it was put up for sale by its trustees.

St John's Parish Club, on Preston Road, has been a familiar sight to local people for generations and a group of local organisations is forming a partnership to purchase the site.

Clayton le Woods Parish Council is teaming up with Whittle Surgery and Chorley Council to put a bid together in order to retain the building as a focal point for residents.

The plan is to redevelop the site as a medical centre, community hub and parish council office.

Chairman of the Parish Council Mark Clifford said. "The pressure on the doctor's surgery has been a concern for residents for some time and this plan will give it a long term future and provide enough space for them to grow and continue to meet the needs of the local community."

Chorley Council is backing the plan as it wants to see buildings like this retained for the benefit of the community.

Leader of Chorley Council, Councillor Alistair Bradley, said: "It's great to see the parish council taking a proactive approach to ensure the building remains a focal point for local residents and at the same time supporting the local GP surgery, which is an integral part of the community.

Too often we see buildings like this standing vacant or being used for different purposes but we can see the benefit of supporting this project, which is what local people want to see happen. The move would help secure the future of the surgery and create more space so it becomes easier for people to access."

Each Sunday we meet at 10: 00 am for our morning service, to which you are warmly welcomed.


Think about joining us for our Coffee mornings on the 2nd Saturday of every month, between 10:30 & 12:00.


The Big Community Skip Day

Update on Landfill Site

Clayton-le-Woods Parish Council continue to monitor the Clayton Hall landfill site run by Quercia Ltd. The Chair of the Parish Council, Councillor Mark Clifford is also the Chair of the Landfill Liaison Group who meet regularly at Chorley Town Hall. The members of the group are from Quercia, Public Health England, The Environment Agency, Lancashire County Council, Chorley Borough Council, Clayton-le-Woods Parish Council, Whittle-le-Woods Parish Council and local residents

Defibrillator on Preston Road

No, it isn't a yellow Tardis. The Parish Council have found a new use for the previously disused telephone box at Bankside on Preston Road. A defibrillator has been installed, adding to the network of this lifesaving equipment across the Borough. The box has been painted yellow so that it is clear to everyone that it contains a defibrillator. You will be instructed about accessing and using the defibrillator, if needed, following a call to 999.

It is hoped to place defibrillators in other locations across Clayton-le-Woods.

Watch Your Speed

We take speeding throughout our village seriously!

Cllr Michelle Gallagher and Cllr Mark Clifford have completed the official training needed to deploy SPID's (Speed Indicator Devices).

The training consisted of classroom and field work. Now we have the ability to deploy SPID's where thought necessary to combat excess speeding.

We will be deploying the SPID at several different locations over the coming weeks and months. We would like to ask residents to contact us if you have excess speeding near you.

SPID'S are battery powered and need charging every few days and we recharge and relocate the SPID on a regular basis.



A Fitting Tribute...

A memorial bench commemorating the work of the late Parish Councillor Rosemary Boyd has been erected in the Back Lane Woods. The bench was carved by a woodland chain saw artist and has animal carvings of moon gazing hares on the arms of the bench. The bench provides a peaceful retreat within the woods.

Great Greens Lane Play Area Improvements

One of the big projects keeping the Parish Council busy during Spring was the work to renovate the play area at Great Greens Lane, Clayton Brook. New play equipment and soft flooring were installed creating a fabulous playground for the local children. A grand opening of the newly renovated play area was held in May with a great turnout of children and their families who enjoyed playing in the bright sunshine. The feedback from the families was very positive with more children than ever enjoying playing on the play area. The Parish Council will be renovating more play areas in Clayton-le-Woods over the coming years as part of their rolling programme for play area renewals. At the same time as the Great Greens Lane play area renovations, Chorley Council carried out work to improve the Multi Use Games Area (MUGA) at Clayton Brook.

Around 100 pupils from the local primary schools in the Parish took part in the fun and games at Clayton Green Sports Centre, including Lancaster Lane Community Primary School, St Bede's Catholic Primary School, Manor Road Primary School, Clayton-le-Woods Church of England Primary School, Westwood Primary School, St John's Church of England Primary School and Clayton Brook Primary School.

The event is very competitive, consisting of various sporting team challenges, followed by a Tug of War and finally a relay obstacle race. The school children go all out to win!

More than 250 supporters watched the competition which saw St. John's Church of England Primary School hailed as Clayton Cup Champions for the third year running.

Members of the Parish Council supported the event and presented the awards and trophies to the participating schools.



Schools Commemorate WW1

To commemorate the centenary of the end of World War1 the Parish Council has provided each of the primary schools in the village with a statue of a First World War Soldier which has been erected in the schools' grounds as a focal point for their commemorations.

Lancaster Lane Primary School have been researching facts and information about their grandparents who fought in different conflicts. The children learnt and recited war poems and sang songs relevant to that time in history. Year 6 pupils have also lead a Remembrance Assembly where the Mayor of Chorley was in attendance.

The school marked the centenary with a week of events; all the children made poppies for the display around the Silent Soldier. Junior classes visited Gawthorpe Hall and took part in WW1 activities, such as writing postcards from the trenches. Families of the children visited school to talk about their experiences in the armed forces. The children learnt about the role of all those affected by WW1, including women and children. On 9th November a special Remembrance Peace Concert was held in school.

St Bede's RC Primary School held their remembrance service on Friday 9th November at 11am. The school focussed on remembering and researching soldiers from the parish who lost their lives and created wreaths in remembrance which were displayed around the Silent Soldier in the school grounds.

Westwood Primary School planted poppies for the fallen soldiers in WW1, 90 men from Brindle and 84 men for Clayton-le-Woods and Whittle-le-Woods. The children also made their own poppies from plastic bottles which were displayed around the Silent Soldier.

Clayton-le-Woods C of E Primary School researched the "Roll of Honour" displayed in the school and Parish Councillor Judith Norris was surprised to see her Grandfather's name, James Tuson along with two other family members, Edward and William Tuson, displayed on the Roll. Councillor Judith Norris was very proud to see that her family were honoured in such a way, "It has made being on the war memorial committee even more special for me", she said. "Keeping these brave heroes' memories alive is a privilege, because they fought that we may have a better tomorrow".

Have you ever wondered where the symbol of a poppy remembrance originated? In 1915, the Canadian poet, Lieutenant- Colonel John McCrae, wrote "In Flanders Fields the poppies blow/between the crosses, row on row." This prompted the suggestion, after the war ended, that the battlefield poppy be used to honour the dead. YWCA volunteer Anna Guerin took up this idea in her native France, and war veterans and their families made fabric flowers and sold them to raise money for charity. This spread across to Britain and in 1921 the first poppy appeal took place using French made flowers, and by 1922 a British factory had been set up that still runs to this day. On the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month of 1918, the guns fell silent.
