Your **Parish Council** Who Are **We**?

Parish Councils are the lowest tier of Local Government. Clayton-le-Woods is a large Parish within the boundary of Chorley and has a long history. It was established in 1894 and comprises 15 voluntary Parish Councillors who are elected for a four year term of office to serve and administer to the needs of the residents of Clayton-le-Woods. The Parish Council employs two part time staff members, a Clerk to the Council, who administers the Parish Council and ensures that the Council conducts its business properly; and a Projects Officer who assists the Councillors in delivering the varied projects across the Parish. The Parish Council is funded through a precept on each residential property in the parish, through your Council tax. This enables us to carry out our duties to improve and maintain the area in which we live.

What Do We Do?

The Parish Council owns several assets, including Back Lane Woods, several Play Areas and the Skate Park near to Asda. The maintenance and improvements of these areas remain high on our agenda, as does the appearance of the Parish.

We employ Lengthsmen from Lisieux Hall to help keep the Parish litter free and we maintain many of the fiower beds around the Parish. This helps to make Clayton-le-Woods one of the prettiest and tidiest parishes in the whole of Chorley. We hope you agree!

A Update On The Landfill Site

The Clayton Hall Landfill site operated by Quercia continues to be a concern for local residents and the parish council still monitor the site. Cllr. Mark Clifford continues to Chair the Liaison group which is attended by representatives from Quercia, Public Health England, The Environment Agency, Lancashire County Council, Chorley Borough council, Clayton-Le-Woods Parish Council, Whittle-Le-Woods Parish Council and local residents. Although there was a blip in issues caused by the active tipping at the site in late July and early August things are still looking much more positive than 18 month ago. Complaints are still coming in but generally at a much reduced rate.

Capping and restoration of the areas of the site that are no longer being used to tip is continuing. Though not as fast as planned due to the heavy rainfall in recent months



Dog Bag Dispensers



So, how often do you find that you have run out of "poo" bags when taking your faithful friend out for a walk? Very rarely, if ever, if you are a responsible dog owner. However, it appears that a small minority of dog owners are not responsible and do not clean up after their

dogs. It is an increasing bane for pedestrians as well as a health risk for humans. The Parish Council have noticed that the complaints have been increasing, particularly in some specific locations.

In an effort to reduce this anti-social behaviour, Clayton-le-Woods Parish Council have decided to provide Doggy Bag dispensers at four locations across the Parish. This is a pilot to see whether it works in reducing the amount of dog fouling in these areas and if so, the Councillors will look at whether the pilot can be extended to other locations across the Parish.

Cllr Mark Clifford says "These dog bag dispensers have proved to be very popular around the country where fitted and have improved the environment for all." Very welcome is a statement from Quercia that the temporary cap that was installed during the major incident will remain permanently in place and is to be covered over as those sections of the site are filled or restored.

The Environment Agency are keeping Clayton Hall as a top priority in Lancashire and Cumbria.

Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL for short!)

e reported in the Summer Newsletter on the process for obtaining a Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) grant from the Parish Council.

CIL is a levy that property developers pay to Councils when they build new housing estates. This money is to enable the Council to provide more services to meet increased needs as a result of more people living in an area. The funds are to be used only for permanent facilities/infrastructure which benefit the community as a whole.

Chorley Council have given some of this money to the Parish Councils where they have new housing being built and voluntary groups and organisations can apply to the Parish Council for a grant from the CIL funding pot to help them provide amenities and services in the local area.

In the Summer Newsletter we asked for your views on the applications received for the July funding round, and the Parish Council have subsequently awarded the following grants:

- Back lane Woods Development into Community Nature Reserve/Forest School: Subject to Full Costing it is planned that the project will proceed early next year
- Lisieux Hall: Outdoor Classroom
- Lancaster Lane Primary School: Outdoor exercise and fitness facilities
- Defibrillator Provision: One defibrillator provided outside Clayton Brook Village Hall/Community Centre
- Cunnery Meadow Footpath: Lighting provided for local footpath in partnership with Chorley Council



Applications for CIL grants in 2020 will be detailed in future Newsletters and on the Parish Council website and Notice Boards

The budget for this year is $\pounds4,000$.

Cunnery Meadow **Play Area**

n the Summer edition of this newsletter we reported that we were progressing work to improve the play area at Cunnery Meadow. Work began on site in July this year and it was expected that the play area would be finished in early September.

Our contractor, Wicksteeds, battled very unseasonable wet weather which delayed the installation work as heavy rains fell in August and September and as a result the site was often flooded.

At the time this newsletter was going to print the play area hadn't been formally handed over to the Parish Council due to the ground conditions still requiring work. However the playground equipment is all installed and all safety checks have been undertaken and passed.

The Parish Council will be organising an opening ceremony once the formal handover is completed.

Following this refurbishment the Parish Council plans to carry out work to upgrade the Manor Road play area in conjunction with Chorley Council. Further information will be posted on the Parish Council website.

Cuerden Hall, Cuerden

The lands at Cuerden, where presently stands the large, red brick building, known as Cuerden Hall, can be seen on records dating back to 1199. These lands were owned by the Molyneauxs; a very affluent and powerful, Sefton family, who were made Lords and gifted them, by Roger de Poictou; a favoured Baron of William the Conqueror.

Through subsequent marriages and inheritances of the wealthiest families in the region - too long to chronicle in this article - the manor house was passed to the Parkers, an important family, originally from Extwistle Hall in Burnley. Having said that, I must mention an early occupant named John Cuerden who did lease a smaller manor house on the same plot in the mid 1500s, when owned by the Banastres of Bank Hall. There are no early pictures of this earlier house, but records of John Cuerden's possessions, on his death can be found listed in his will of 1603. This manor house was demolished by Banastre Parker and rebuilt by him in 1717.

Ine portrait opposite was commissioned by Robert's constituents in 1857 on his retirement as an MP. He was one of the first MPs in Queen Victoria's new parliament at the age of 24 years. He died at the age of 86 after a long political and remarkable life. During his time at Cuerden

Hall he commissioned Lewis Wyatt to design and build the Hall, plus the parklands surrounding. It is really thanks to him and the subsequent work by Cuerden Valley Trust, that we now have the extensive, 650 acre, beautiful Cuerden Valley Park for the public to enjoy.

Cuerden Hall was bequeathed to Reginald Tatton, a great nephew of Robert Townley Parker in 1904, as his son and heir, Thomas, was childless. Reginald carried out some alterations to the hall, but these were not extensive. Changes were mainly made in the stables to accommodate his passion for Daimler cars, although as an engineer by trade, he developed a better water supply from the lake and introduced electricity to the hall.

Reginald and his wife Winnifred had a son Thomas who eventually sold the hall to the Army in 1950 plus the vast estate and buildings in a private sale, before moving to Devon. After the Army moved out in 1977, it was taken over by the Central Lancashire Development Corporation, who passed the parklands to the Cuerden Valley Park Trust in the mid-1980s..

The Hall has been used by the Sue Ryder Foundation as a nursing home for young adults with neurological conditions since 1984, but, at the time of writing, I believe they are having a new home built in the north of Preston area, as the Grade II* listed Hall has been found to be no longer suitable for their needs.

Whittle-le-Woods & Clayton-le-Woods War Memorial

n 1925 a local resident left in her will a plot of land to Whittle-le-Woods and Clayton-le-Woods Parish Councils. The land was situated just off the A6 Preston Road close to the boundary between the two parishes, for the purpose of erecting a War Memorial to remember the soldiers from both villages killed in the 1914 – 1918 First World War. The first meeting of the newly constituted War Memorial Committee was held in March 1926. To this day three representatives from each Parish Council meet regularly to ensure that the War Memorial itself and the grounds that surround it are maintained to a high standard for the benefit of the Community.

At the end of the Second World War the War Memorial was engraved to commemorate the soldiers from Whittle-le-Woods and Clayton-le-Woods who were killed in the 1939 – 1945 conflict.

The War Memorial Ground has flower beds and seating areas ideal for those members of the public who wish to visit and reminisce, or even just sit quietly and enjoy the air of tranquility. The War Memorial itself is seated at the top of the grounds. Access is from Preston Road, or Kem Mill Lane, the adjacent car park also is part of the War Memorial grounds. If you live in our villages and have not yet paid a visit please take a look.

Each year on Remembrance Sunday a service is held at the War Memorial. We meet at 2.15 in Whittle-Le-Woods Primary School playground before proceeding down Preston Road to the War Memorial accompanied by a Brass Band, local Scouts and Guides, the Mayor and Mayoress of Chorley, Councillors, British Legion and local organisations and members of the Public. The service is conducted by the Reverend Philip Venables from Whittle St.John's Church assisted by Clergy from St Bede's RC Church, Whittle Methodist and St Chad's RC Church.

New Cleaning Barrow for **Clayton Brook Lengthsmen**

 Iayton Brook is kept clean and tidy thanks to the work of the lengthsmen who go out in all weathers to sweep the area around the shops and community centres.

It may strike you as a peculiar term to use to describe someone who is responsible for street cleaning as a lengthsman, but the term is an old one, dating back to the middle ages and referred originally to someone who keeps a length of road free of muck and rubbish; lots of it about in medieval times.

In modern times lengthsmen are usually employed by a Parish Council to keep areas clean and tidy, and Clayton-le-Woods Parish Council employ five part time lengthsmen at Clayton Brook.

The Clayton-le-Woods Parish lengthsmen use a cleaning barrow to transport the bins and brushes that they need, and over the years this barrow has worked hard! In the last few months it became clear that it was getting to the end of its useful life and the lengthsmen desperately needed a replacement. The Parish Council contacted Places for People about the issue and thanks to their generous donation, the Clayton-le-Woods Parish Lengthsmen are now the proud owners of a brand new barrow!

Defibrillators in Clayton-le-Woods

Defibrillators are very important aids to save lives if someone suffers a cardiac arrest.

If you need a defibrillator in an emergency, the 999 call handler will often know where one is and tell you, so you can ask someone to get it. By performing CPR and using a defibrillator, you'll give someone the best possible chance of survival.

The Parish Council installed a defibrillator in the old telephone box on Preston Road at Bankside last year, and to ensure the public know that it is there the Parish Council painted the telephone box yellow! This has proved an online advertising success with other bodies who are considering

installing a defibrillator, as Chorley Council have reported over 1900 hits on their website and other providers following suit!

A new defibrillator has been installed in the north of Clayton-le-Woods, attached to the community centre/village hall at Clayton Brook. The Parish Council are looking at providing more defibrillators across the Parish and if you have a suggestion for a suitable location please contact the Parish Clerk.

Wildflower Meadow

Back Lane Woods

The planned works to enhance bio diversity and the creation of a community nature reserve have now gone to tender. Several companies have been asked to tender for the contracts to improve the woodland by creating a community nature reserve and also manage the reserve over the coming years.

The decision to award the contract will be taken in early 2020 with work to commence shortly afterwards. Cllr Mark Clifford says:

"This is a great opportunity to enhance the woodland and to educate future generations in the need to protect our environment."

Milestones in History

ur milestone was repaired last year after part of it was found lying on the pavement. It is situated on the pavement on the corner of Preston Road /Swansey Road.

On the A6, which runs through the Parish of Clayton-le-Woods, stand milestones, which tell us the distance between the local towns of Preston and Chorley.

Originated by the Romans, one of the oldest measuring stones is situated near Ribchester. However, by the end of the 17th century, our measuring system was not right. Travellers complained of the long miles found in Yorkshire! With the era of mapping - started by John



Ogilby, whom it is said laid the ground for the increasing wide use of the statute mile - 1760 yards. Over the next three centuries turnpike trusts, groups and individuals set out milestones, followed by local councils.

In 1888, highways and their signage became the responsibility of the new county councils. Milestones remain public property. Look out for them.
