Who Are We?

Parish Councils are the lowest or first tier of Local Government. Clayton-le-Woods is a large Parish within the boundary of Chorley and has a long history. It was established in 1894 and comprises 15 voluntary Parish Councillors who are elected for a four year term of office to serve and administer to the needs of the residents of Clayton-le-Woods. The Parish Council employs two part time staff members, a Clerk to the Council, who administers the Parish Council and ensures that the Council conducts its business properly; and a Projects Officer who assists the Councillors in delivering the varied projects across the Parish. The Parish Council is funded through a precept on each residential property in the parish, through your Council tax. This enables us to carry out our duties to improve and maintain the area in which we live.

What Do We Do?

The Parish Council owns several assets, including Back Lane Woods, several Play Areas and the Skate Park near to Asda. The maintenance and improvements of these areas remain high on our agenda, as does the appearance of the Parish.

We employ Lengthsmen from Lisieux Hall to help keep the Parish litter free and we maintain many of the flower beds around the Parish. This helps to make Clayton-le-Woods one of the preffiest and tidiest parishes in the whole of Chorley. We hope you agree!

An Update On The Landfill Site

The Clayton Hall Landfill site operated by Quercia continues to be a concern for local residents and the Parish Council continue to monitor the site.

Cllr. Mark Clifford has been chairing the Liaison Group for over a year now and this is attended by Quercia, Public Health England, The Environment Agency, Lancashire County Council, Chorley Borough Council, Clayton-Le-Woods Parish Council, Whittle-Le-Woods Parish Council and local residents.

We are happy to report that the overall outlook is much improved. Looking back a year Quercia were still battling to get the problem sections of the landfill properly capped and were having difficulty keeping the cap sealed. They had also ceased all tipping operations. Thousands of complaints from the public had been registered by the Environment Agency and these were still coming in at a rate of several complaints a day.

Fast forward to now and complaints have dropped to just a few a month. The site itself has undergone many changes for the better. There has been over 8650 square metres of temporary capping installed. The northern sections of the site have been permanently capped now though this needs a bit more levelling work with better soils being brought in this summer.

Improvements on site keep coming with another 14000 square metres of capping due to start in May.



This should vastly improve the visual impact of the site.

The Environment Agency are keeping Clayton Hall as a top priority.

Blooming Gorgeous & Environmentally Friendly!





The hanging basket displays across Clayton-le-Woods are always beautifull However what most of us may not be aware of is the fact that the company that the Parish Council use have strong eco friendly practices to ensure that they limit any adverse impact on the environment. This was an important consideration in the Council's decision to award the contract to "Plantscape".

There are a number of ways Plantscape limit their impact, they use baskets with deep reservoirs so that the hanging baskets only need to be watered once a week, they use long lasting baskets but when they do come to the end of their useful life the baskets are not put into landfill. Instead the company recycle them into a crumb which is re-used to make more baskets and planters.

Finally, the used compost and vegetation from the baskets at the end of our fabulous summers are emptied into trailers and collected by local farmers to be spread over their fields thereby giving nutrients and organic matter back into the land and the cycle goes on!

S carecrow festivals are held all over the world but they are especially popular in the UK, where the use of scarecrows as a protector of crops dates from time immemorial.

Today, hundreds of villages all over the UK bring colour, vibrancy and fun to their neighbourhoods by organising scarecrow festivals.

Clayton-le-Woods Parish Council have run a Scarecrow Festival over the previous 2 years and will be holding one again this year.

Scarecrows come in all shapes and sizes, ranging from the traditional type made from sacks and straw to the more sophisticated ones. The challenge is to use whatever materials you can lay your hands on – pots and pans, tree stumps and branches, broken furniture and old clothing.

Schools, families, businesses, and shops in Clayton-le-Woods will be invited to make their own scarecrows and display them outside.

Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL For Short!)



hen property developers build new housing estates in our borough they have to pay a "levy" to Chorley Council. This money is to enable the Council to provide more services to meet any increased need that is potentially required as a result of more people living in an area. Chorley Council have given some of this money to Parish Councils where they have new houses being built. As a result Clayton-le-Woods have CIL funding available to support local projects that will benefit the community and help to address demands placed on our area from increased housing development. This is not limited to projects that are solely in Clayton-le-Woods.

Parish Council Tax 2019/20

A the 2019 January meeting Claytonle-Woods Council agreed its budget for the coming financial year beginning on 1st April 2019 running through to the 31st March 2020.

Th parish council tax element for an average Band D household will remain at £22.00 which is the same as last year. This equates to under £2.00 per month for all Parish Council services.

The Parish Council wish to continue providing a good service which includes the angoing development of play area facilities, bowling green, footpaths, open space management, Summer/Winter planting, the Summer Fair and the Christmas Tree Switch on event. If you have any ideas for a community event or public amenity that would enhance the Parish please do let the Parish Council know.

id you know that the Parish Council have a grant policy which is designed to assist voluntary, community projects and groups. The parish Council set the overall budget for Grant Application each year in January.

The budget for this year is £4,000.

CIL Applications – We Want Your Views

The CIL grants are awarded twice a year, in July and in February. The process for awarding the CIL grant funding involves the Parish Council seeking the views of the community about the proposed projects before any grants are awarded. The Parish Council will do this through this Newsletter and by posting notices on our Parish Council Naticeboard and putting the information on the Parish Council Website.

The CIL applications received for the July awards are detailed below:

Gelston Manor Nursery

This project involves the creation of a wooden autbuilding in the rear grounds of Gelston Manor Children's Nursery The building will be home to a before and after school club, with the potential for many alternative uses outside of normal operating hours.

Back Lane Woods

The aim of this project is to create a community nature reserve for the local residents. This will involve improving the woodland; creating an outdoor classroom for use by local schools and groups; improving the footpaths to enable easier access into the woodland.

Lisieux Hall

This project is to create an outdoor classroom with a smooth safety surface, a planted border area and seating to allow people with learning difficulties to safety access the outdoors and so improve their mental health and overall wellbeing.

Lancaster Lane Primary School

This project is to develop new fitness facilities within the school grounds. This will include a 1 mile running track and the installation of re-bound panels on the tarmac area for football, basketball and cricket. This facility will then be made available for use by the local community.

Defibrillator Provision

The project is to provide an additional two defibrillators within Clayton-le-Woods so that each ward is provided with one, so there will be one within Clayton North and one within Clayton West.

Cunnery Meadow Footpath Lighting

This project is to provide lighting to the footpath that runs from Cunnery Meadow, at the rear of Lancaster Lane School.

Cuerden Valley Parkrun

If you go down to Cuerden Valley Park at 9.00 on a Saturday morning you will probably see a couple of hundred people setting off on a 5K (just over 3 miles) course around the park. They will be running, jogging or walking around the park to see how long it takes them to complete the 5K course. This is the Saturday Cuerden Valley Parkrun.

Parkrun was initially started in London by a group of friends in London in 2004. The idea of a free 5K run in a park quickly spread and there now Parkruns that take place at over 1400 locations in 23 different countries. They nearly all start at 9 am on a Saturday morning and while a lot of them do take place in parks there are some in other locations.

The Cuerden Valley Parkrun course is an a mixture of tarmac paths and trail paths through the woods. It's a two lap course and if you walk in to the park from the Town Brow car park then the course starts on the path that goes through the meadow.





Shortly after the start it heads up the path on the right that goes up the hill in to the woods. It then follows the path through the woods and then heads down to the bridge and across the river. It's then right up in to the woods, round the Heron Pond and then downhill on the tarmac path and along the path back towards the start and back up in to the woods for the second lap. After doing this twice it's on to where it started as this is the finish line.

Participation in Parkrun is free. It is run by volunteers and sponsorship covers the administration costs. If you want to give it a go then first you need to register with Parkrun at www.parkrun.org.uk. It costs nothing to register and you get a bar code that you can print off and use at any of the Parkruns that take place both in the UK and at locations in other countries. When you get to the finish of a Parkrun then you get a tag that is scanned in with your barcode and later that day you will get a text message or email with your time. You can also see the results on the website, If you're interested then more information can be found at www.parkrun.org.uk/cuerdenvalley/.

They also always need volunteers to help with marshalling and other tasks and if you feel you could help there is also more information about this on the website.

Everyone is welcome!




Car Parking is £1.10 for two hours. Entry to the park is free.

t had long been thought that there was a Roman Road buried somewhere underneath the A49 or the A5083 in Clayton-le-Woods and Cuerden, and recent building development has enabled the precise location to be identified. A team of archaeologists from the University of Salford have been working on the site to uncover the section of road, with support from Wigan Archaeological Society.

The Roman road consists of a cambered surface of gravel and cobbles, believed to have come from the nearby River Lostock and the road itself was astonishingly 11.40 metres wide. The Roman's certainly knew how to build roads!

This find has enabled further excavations in Cuerden which revealed evidence of a medieval hamlet around the location of the Roman road. A large collection of medieval pottery was discovered. The finds included Late Medieval Reduced Greenwares and Midlands Purple which had never previously been seen in the area.

At the remains of Pinfold House in Cuerden, further excavation revealed lead weights, a spindle whorl and a carved bone handle dating to the medieval period, giving insight into the lives of previous occupants of this medieval

Remarkable Reservoir

ou may have noticed some strange-looking objects on the grass verge near the roundabout on the A6 at the top of Westwood Road!

These are some of the original pipes and brick work from the old underground Leyland Reservoir that was built in Back Lane in Clayton-le-Woods in 1884 and demolished in October 2013 to make way for a housing development.

The underground reservoir was built during 1883/84 to give Leyland it's first public water supply, and was brick vaulted with a capacity of 336,000 gallons.

The water was pumped, using steam power, from a nearby deep well up to the reservoir for storage.

It then flowed, by gravity through an 8in cast iron pipe to Leyland. The pumping station and reservoirs ceased to be in use in the 1940s when a larger reservoir was brought into use, however it was maintained as a back-up until the 1980s.

The pumping station was sited on the A6, and is now used as offices. The reservoir was demolished in 2013 and new houses built on the site in Back Lane.


Before it was demolished, the site was opened to the public for 2 weeks by Kingswood Homes, the building company.


Over 20,000 people visited in that short period.

With funding from the Borough Council, Parish Council and Chorley Building Society, Chorley Historical Society created the memorial to the reservoir.
